CADET WING MEDIA – GRADUATION 2010

ACCEPTANCE PARADE

The Acceptance Parade will take place on 4 August at 9:00 a.m. The fourth class cadets will be released after the Acceptance Parade (and pinning of the shoulder boards). The parents are invited to spend time with their cadets until 1:00 p.m. Cadets may not leave the Academy.

Cadets and families/friends may eat lunch anywhere ON BASE, including Mitchell Hall which offers a buffet for \$4.25. The Field House, Arnold Hall and Visitor Center are within walking distance and offer lunch items as well. Many families bring coolers and just have a picnic tailgate-style or throw a blanket on the grass.

Parking will be at the Field House and there will be shuttle buses to take everyone to the parade field. If a cooler is brought, we recommend it be left in the vehicle rather than carrying it on the bus and then be retrieved after the parade.

Can I bring stuff to my cadet at the Acceptance Parade (printer, bike, other large items)?

The items fourth-classmen are allowed to have their first year are extremely limited. In accordance with the Cadet Sight Picture, fourth-classmen are allowed two items of personal memorabilia in addition to what they have been issued. All other items need Air Officer Commanding (AOC) or Academy Military Trainer (AMT) approval. Parents are advised to have their cadets verify what they are bringing or shipping to USAFA is an item they are allowed to possess prior to bringing or shipping the items.

Mitchell Hall is the largest dining facility in the Air Force and provides service for the entire Cadet Wing of 4500+ cadets for the upcoming school year. Our primary mission is to provide 3 meals a day, 7 days a week for the Cadet Wing. We also support all training missions and requirements, all social events and training and sporting events along with numerous other requirements.

Meals at Mitchell Hall are planned by our nutritionist and they follow standards of the Dietary Guidelines for Americans and the Military Dietary Recommended Intake Levels. We provide menus and portions to accommodate the requirements of the majority of the Cadet Wing. Also, we provide heavy, light and vegetarian options to athletes with certain requirements as well as cadets with ethnic or religious requirements.

Mitchell Hall produces over 13,000 meals a day and in doing so we face the understandable challenges of trying to meet the tastes and desires of all the cadets. We try our best to meet the needs of the majority and offer a good variety of foods. We also have the challenge of accommodating all 4500 cadets with the food ready to consume in 20 minutes twice a day.

This year, the staff at Mitchell Hall has given the menu a thorough review. The result has been “Mitch’s Over Haul,” our effort to upgrade and up-value the menu. We have added specialty nights and theme meals coupled with a bigger marketing campaign to let cadets know when the specials are coming up. We have developed a schedule of special meals for the entire academic year and are looking forward to supporting your cadets in a first class way. The Cadet Focus Group is still going strong and is a valuable asset to helping us make menu decisions for the facility.

We would like to invite you to meet our nutritionist and members of the management team during the Information Fair on Friday, 3 September, the first day of Parents’ Weekend. We will be providing information on how we plan menus, the nutritional values we look at, and the calorie requirements for the cadets, and we’ll be glad to answer any questions you might have.

You will also have the opportunity to dine with us at Mitchell hall during Parents’ Weekend. The 1st class breakfast and 4th class lunch tickets will be available for cadets to purchase from their cadet squadrons in mid August. Tickets must be purchased in advance.

The entire Mitchell Hall staff looks forward to meeting you and hosting you at a meal during Parents' Weekend.

RABIES INFORMATION from USAFA's Public Health Office

General Information

- Rabies is a preventable viral disease of mammals; the virus affects the central nervous system of mammals, causing a fatal inflammation of the brain and spinal cord.
- The rabies virus is in the saliva of infected animals and is transmitted mainly through bites; the most direct way for people to get rabies is through the bites of infected wild animals.
- Rabies is found mainly in wild animals such as bats, skunks, foxes and raccoons.
 - Pets like dogs, cats and ferrets, as well as livestock (including horses!), can get rabies if they have not been vaccinated and are bitten by rabid wild animals.

Rabies in Colorado

- Rabies is on the rise throughout the country and Colorado and USAFA are no exception.
- As of 22 June 2010, 3 foxes in El Paso County have tested positive for rabies this year and 65 animals in all of Colorado have tested positive for the disease.
 - 46 skunks, 10 bats, 5 foxes and 1 muskrat, 1 deer, 1 horse and 1 domestic cat.
 - Colorado is on track to break the record from 2009 of 103 animals confirmed with rabies.

Prevention

- Protect your family
 - Do not feed wild animals; do not touch or approach wild or stray animals.
 - Tightly close garbage cans or store them in a garage; open trash attracts wild/stray animals.
 - Call your health care provider *immediately* if you or your family are bitten or scratched by a wild or unknown animal.
- Protect your pets
 - Vaccinate your pets against rabies.
 - Maintain control of your pets when outdoors.
 - Contact your veterinarian *immediately* if your pet is bitten or scratched by a wild or unknown animal.
- How to recognize sick or diseased wildlife.
 - Healthy wild animals are normally afraid of humans; sick or diseased animals often do not run away from people.
 - Wildlife suffering from rabies will often act aggressively and violently approach people or pets; rabid wildlife might also stumble or have trouble walking.

- Foxes, skunks and raccoons are active at night. When these animals are spotted during the day and do not shy away from people, they should be avoided and reported to the Division of Wildlife.

Air Force football team ranked second nationally in APR

U.S. AIR FORCE ACADEMY, Colo. – The Air Force football team has the second-highest multi-year Academic Progress Rate (APR) of any team in the Football Bowl Subdivision, according to a report issued today by the NCAA. The program's 988 ranks second only to Rutgers, who had a 992, among the 120 FBS football playing schools. The multi-year APR is for the 2005-06, 2006-07, 2007-08 and 2008-09 academic years.

Air Force's number is easily the best within the Mountain West Conference. TCU is second with a 968 while Utah is third at 949. Colorado State is fourth with a 945 followed by BYU (940), New Mexico and UNLV (934), San Diego State (931) and Wyoming (928).

The Academy is also the highest ranking service academy, as Navy posted a 973 and Army a 964. The remainder of the top five nationally shows Rice third with 987, Northwestern fourth at 986 and Duke fifth at 983.

"This is hands down the finest accomplishment in all of college football. There should be no hesitation to identify educational achievements along with character development in major conference intercollegiate sports" Air Force head football coach Troy Calhoun said. "The Air Force Academy is a very challenging leadership school; and yet, the determination and perseverance of these cadets with the support of our outstanding faculty and staff moved them beyond the necessary standards of the Academy. It's remarkable that a team can have its

members take over 18 semester hours of the nation's most demanding curriculum, prepare to serve our country, and still balance participation as a Division 1 athlete in a major conference."

Each year the NCAA honors selected Division I sports teams by publicly recognizing their latest multiyear APR. This announcement is part of the overall Division I academic reform effort and is intended to highlight teams who demonstrate a commitment to academic progress and retention of student-athletes by achieving the top APRs within their respective sports. Specifically, these teams posted multiyear APRs in the top 10 percent of all squads in each sport.

The APR provides a real-time look at a team's academic success each semester by tracking the academic progress of each student-athlete on scholarship. The APR accounts for eligibility, retention and graduation and provides a measure of each team's academic performance.
